This season twenty four candidates from Gloucestershire rugby clubs are advancing their leadership and management skills through the RFU Leadership Academy, supported by eight mentors.

The Academy, kicked off with a launch event in October supported by MARSH. It was set up to raise awareness of the importance of leadership, as well as developing those with the potential to lead the sport into the future. Endorsement by the Institute of Leadership & Management (ILM) means candidate benefit by having access to a wide range of online resources, workshop opportunities, e-zines and certification on completion. Through the use of personal development plans, as well as group and 1-2-1 mentoring, the Academy offers close assistance and guidance during the delegate's

development plans. During the Academy, candidates have attended a number of support workshops including: Leadership; Understanding your Facility Needs & Making them a Reality; A Practical Approach to Risk Assessments; Organisation Structures (including exploring Incorporation, charity & CASC status). DON'T BE A HEAD CASE

Don't be a 'Headcase'

The RFU is putting in place new standards relating to the management of concussion and extending the reach of its concussion education initiatives. The return to play pathway for players who have sustained a concussion is dependent on the player's age and the medical resources that they can access. The new routine minimum stand-down period is 19 days for adults and 23 days for U19s. The minimum stand-down period for those in an Enhanced Care Setting—typically professional and elite age-group players—is six days for adults and

12 days for U17-U19s. These are players whose return to play pathway is closely supervised by an appropriately trained and suitably experienced medical practitioner. New education measures include a mandatory player safety course for RFU licensed coaches and additional promotional materials that add to acclaimed existing resources. The standards, which come into effect immediately, have been put in place following revised guidelines from the IRB.


In this months edition please use this game below and tell us how you get on when using it during your pre-season.

Game: Fijian Touch

Equipment needed: 4 cones & a ball

Area: 30x 30

Game Description: Normal rules of touch rugby except it takes two touches by two different players to make a tackle. You can play offload, chicken scratch or quick ruck touch.



Key Coaching Points

- Importance of getting behind the defensive line.
- Highlighting and then beating a man one on one situation or someone who is isolated.

Relevance to the Game

- Promotes the importance of beating the first defender and getting behind defences. Also highlighting the importance of close support. This game also manufactures an inevitable cover defence. Excellent for speeding a game of touch up and getting the 'go forward' rugby.
