

Written evidence of rugby in Drybrook can be traced back as far as 1881 and it is almost certain that some games would have been played in the area before this date. It was in this year that the Drybrook Good Templars took on the Forest Rangers at a field near Euroclydon and a lot of familiar Drybrook surnames were present in both line ups.

There were lots of rugby matches taking place all over the Forest of Dean around this time, some organised in line with the RFU which was itself a fledgling organisation, and others organised by enthusiasts who made their own rules as they went along.

The club with which we are familiar today came into existence in the 1892/93 season so this year marks the  $125^{th}$  year.

The first one hundred years of the club's history were recorded in "One Hundred Years of Drybrook Rugby" back in 1992 so the purpose of this book is to record the history of the last twenty five years.

There was much to celebrate in the first one hundred years but the last twenty five seasons have brought unprecedented success based firmly on stability, and togetherness coupled with sheer dogged determination and tenacity. All of this has been brought about by a great deal of hard work and commitment from a long list of dedicated players, volunteers and supporters.

The Drybrook rugby "family" is now the envy of many clubs, both locally and nationally. The increase in membership and improvement in both playing standards and facilities show no signs of slowing down.

One thing that has not changed though is that the enjoyment and friendship gained from playing or supporting rugby football at Drybrook is as important today as it was one hundred and twenty five years ago.




#### Ben Large *Club Captain*



he centenary season was very busy for the club with a total of 38 matches played by the 1<sup>st</sup> XV. Many of these were celebratory games against both traditional and representative opposition so returning to an ordinary season was expected to be a bit of an anti-climax by most forecasters.

As it was Drybrook rugby was in pretty good shape with the club about to embark on its second season in the old Western Counties League.

Flanker James Bennett took over the captaincy from Chris Treherne with ex Gloucester forward Phil Winnel and Cinderford's Chris Jelf taking over the coaching duties from the long serving Peter Jones.



The season began with a very enjoyable pre-season training camp at the Bordon Army Barracks in Hampshire where a party of 35 players enjoyed the hospitality of the School of Mechanical & Electrical Engineers.

The training weekend took the form of a trial match on the Saturday against

the Regiment's Rugby XV followed by the first match of the season against Petersfield RFC on the Sunday.

The match at Petersfield resulted in a 48pts – 10pts victory for Drybrook which set them up nicely for the season ahead.

Drybrook ended the season in 7<sup>th</sup> place in the very competitive 13 team league which at the time was not played on a home and away basis.

Travelling distances were not unfamiliar with today's games and opponents came from all over the south west of England and included the likes of Penzance & Newlyn, Launceston and Devonport Services.

The fixture list also contained many tough friendly games which included narrow defeats away at Lydney 1<sup>st</sup> XV and BerryHill 1<sup>st</sup> XV as well as a drawn match with Cinderford 1<sup>st</sup> XV.

One disappointment though was an early 3<sup>rd</sup> round exit from the county cup at the hands of Brockworth who were becoming a force to be reckoned with. The season

ended with the club retaining the Forest of Dean Senior Combination cup in convincing style with a 20pts - 6pts victory over Cinderford United despite having prop Ian Treherne red carded after 20 minutes.

Two newcomers who made an immediate impact to the Drybrook back division were Steve Skelton and Dave Birtwhistle but it was old hands Chris Treherne (148pts) and Vice-captain Mike Johnson (111pts) who monopolised the scoring.

## **UNITED XV**

A disappointing display in the Forest of Dean Combination Junior final typified a season of under achievement for the Drybrook 2<sup>nd</sup> XV. They ended the final on the wrong end of a 12pts – 9pts defeat at the hands of Cinderford Stags after extra time but never really looked like lifting the trophy.

Scrum half Clayton Ryder was the season's skipper and he had to contend with a constantly changing team which led to an incredible 81 players being used throughout the season. Despite winning more than half their games this was not a vintage season for them but at least they had the satisfaction of tasting victory against all of the Forest clubs. Elsewhere the best displays were victories over Cheltenham North, Avonmouth and Luctonians and a drawn game with Old Patesians.

## **EXTRAS XV**

Under the leadership of Jeff Russell the 3<sup>rd</sup> XV enjoyed a good first half to the season but then injuries, particularly amongst front row players, made life difficult and the season ended with a string of narrow defeats.

Of the victories the ones over Newent 1<sup>st</sup> XV, BerryHill Wappers, Dings Crusaders 3rds and Cinderford Bucks were the most pleasing and it was also nice to entertain a completely new club in Tudorville RFC and a thrilling game resulted in a 20pts – 19pts victory for the men from Ross.

## 4<sup>th</sup> XV

The  $4^{th}$  XV were again led by Jefferson Tate but inevitably bore the brunt of injuries and unavailability of players from the senior sides.

There were some particularly difficult fixtures played mainly because of the lack of genuine 4<sup>th</sup> team opposition from other clubs. Bredon 1sts, Dowty 1sts and a string of third and even second teams were encountered.

## **VETERANS XV**

The Veterans XV managed 3 games during the season picking up victories over Westbury-on -Severn and Ledbury.

## LADIES RUGBY

The Drybrook Squirrels were only formed in the latter half of the previous season and spent most of this season searching for their first ever victory. That day duly came at the eleventh attempt against Luctonians by 15pts – 10pts and there was much cause for celebration in the clubhouse afterwards. Mandy Worthen, Emma Daughtry and Tracey Thomas grabbed the all-important tries. The Ladies only won one of their 12 games but gained valuable experience along the way.

## **JUNIOR RUGBY**



#### SEASON 1994-1995

There was a lot pressure building about whether the sport should go professional or not but the impact was already being felt even at Drybrook's level. Illegal payments or generous expenses were becoming commonplace amongst those who could afford it and this made for a distorted look about some leagues. Some clubs obviously benefitted from being able to attract better players and were able to increase their squad sizes whilst the rest of us were left to try and compete against the odds.



Nevertheless it was to their credit that in the

main Drybrook was able to compete and eventually ended up in 10<sup>th</sup> position in an increasingly competitive Western Counties League.

James Bennett was elected captain for a second season and Chris Jelf took on the role of head coach following Phil Winnel's resignation in the summer.

Mike "Oscar" Rawlings was elected Drybrook's first ever 1<sup>st</sup> team manager, a role now vital to ensure the successful running of the team.

The season will be remembered for the appalling weather that blighted a lot of the games, both home and away, but thankfully the Dene Magna school pitches came to the rescue on a number of occasions.

There were some very difficult fixtures to contend with in the league with eventual champions Launceston, Penzance & Newlyn, Dings Crusaders and Devonport Services the best teams by some distance.

The friendly fixtures were equally as tough with games against Pontypool Athletic, Dunvant Athletic, Luctonians, Hornets and Worcester 1<sup>st</sup> XV particularly difficult for the small squad to deal with.

In the county cup Drybrook succumbed to a third round defeat at Spartans whilst in the Forest cup they were unable to hang onto their crown for a third year when they were derailed by a last minute try from John Edwards in their 16pts – 18pts semi-final defeat at Lydney.

Of the other games there were some pleasing victories over the likes of Monmouth, Old Centralians and Old Patesians but perhaps the best was on New Year's Eve when Cinderford 1<sup>st</sup> XV were defeated by 18pts – 6pts in front of a very large crowd. Chris Treherne again dominated the scoring and included 9 tries in his overall total of 257 points. No 8 Victor Jones played in every one of the games with Chris Rawlings, Ian Dubberley and Lee Wilks all managing 29 appearances.

Two younger players to make a considerable impact were returning scrum half Leon Meek and winger Owen Salmon whilst flanker Chris Hale from Cinderford also proved a useful addition to the squad.

The season ended with a very enjoyable tour to Scotland with a fixture against Moray House RFC.

## **UNITED XV**

Centre three quarter Martyn Hale took on the role of United XV skipper and the team managed 16 wins and four draws in their 31 games.

For the first time the Gloucestershire Police XV was on the fixture list and Drybrook managed to claim victory in both of those games. Elsewhere there were fixtures with Cinderford and Lydney United as well as more traditional opponents such as Hereford, Yatton, Old Patesians and Gordon League.

Some notable victories were achieved over Dings Crusaders, Luctonians and BerryHill with some highly entertaining drawn games against Longlevens, Hornets, Westbury and Tredworth.

Unfortunately the team tasted another narrow defeat in the final of the Forest Junior Cup, this time by 6pts - nil at the hands of Lydney Extras at Cinderford. In the previous rounds they showed much promise by overcoming Newent 1st XV and BerryHill Extras but they could not reproduce that form in the final.

## EXTRAS XV

Hooker Nigel Bennett was elected captain for this season and had to contend with using 84 players in the 29 games played.

His side were rocked mid-way through the season with the death of popular back row player Mark Barrington who was tragically killed in a road accident. The team won only 10 of the games and slipped to a number of close defeats but at least had the satisfaction of defeating Cinderford Stags, Newent 1<sup>st</sup> XV and Tudorville who they trounced 49pts – nil.

The season ended with a disappointing showing in the Forest Minor Cup Final when they went down by 22pts – 3pts to Westbury 2nds, a team they had beaten by 38pts – nil on New Year's Eve.

## **4**<sup>тн</sup> XV

The 4<sup>th</sup>'s struggled to find suitable opposition at times and also struggled for players in a difficult season. Martin Burge, Simon Brain and Jeff Tate shared the captaincy duties

Their first victory of the season came against Old Centralians where Steve Johnson scored all his team's points in his first game for several years. After that there were only 3 more wins to celebrate against a total of 12 losses.

Opposition included Lydney 3rds, and even Ledbury 2nds, such was the dearth of genuine  $4^{th}$  teams operating at the time.

Dave Leighton headed the try scorers with 5 and Graham Bent missed just one of the 16 games played.

The Veterans' XV managed a few games during the season including a highly enjoyable tens tournament at Westbury RFC where they reached the semi-final. The tournament was held to raise money for the Alan Hyett appeal, a Westbury player who unfortunately sustained a broken neck in a match against Cinderford.

## LADIES XV

The Ladies (or Squirrels) as they became known joined the South West Division 4 North this season where they enjoyed some degree of success.

Under the leadership of Jo Leighton they managed to record victories over Tewkesbury, Kingswood (twice), Chipping Sodbury and Avonmouth but were no match for the more experienced teams like Marjons (Plymouth), Clifton, Lydney Topcats and Tor who all had greater resources to call on. The team were also involved in drawn games at Shrewsbury and at Tetbury.

Powerful No 8 Annette Anstice was the leading try scorer with 9 and other players to make the headlines were Rachel Jones, Mandy Worthen and Sharon Townley.

The final playing record was Played 19 Won 6 Drawn 2 Lost 11 Points for 167 Points against 519

## JUNIOR RUGBY

The section continued to expand and really took off in this season with Gaynor Ward as chairperson. Under her astute leadership the section became better organised and began to become a force to be reckoned with.

Off the field the committee were concentrating their efforts on a project to raise the money to replace the leaking roofs on the function room and changing room.

Mrs Lin Tingle headed a fund raising subcommittee that produced miracles to raise the £9000 required in just over 12 months through the generosity of friends and supporters and lots of help from members of the club. A series of events were held throughout the year such as dances, raffles, auctions, quizzes and fun days etc

The highlight of the fund raising campaign was a grand challenge match that took place on Boxing Day between Gary Payne's Pumas

#### **SEASON 1995-1996**


ired by the success of the 1995 World Cup media moguls threw money at the sport and the IRB declared rugby union professional. The change came halfway through the northern hemisphere 1995/96 season but it made little difference to Drybrook who simply couldn't afford to pay any players and in any case had no intention of doing so.

On the other hand there were clubs at Drybrook's level who readily embraced professionalism and this made it a very difficult proposition for the season ahead.

It was against this backdrop that second row Richard Sadler took over as first team skip-



per with Chris Jelf again undertaking the coaching duties.



The excitement generated in travelling long distances to play new fixtures was beginning to lose its appeal especially given the strength of some of the opposition clubs.

Nevertheless Drybrook soldiered on and eventually ended up in 11th place in the 12 team league.

Relegation was only avoided by the knock-on effect from the higher leagues meaning only Crediton went down but Drybrook's cause was not helped by the deduction of 2 points for a player registration error.

The only real trouncing they had was at Keynsham where

they had to play against half of the Bath Academy but the Somerset club were consequently docked a lot of points for flouting the registration laws and in doing so missed out on probable promotion.

Elsewhere there were victories over lower half teams Crediton, Paignton and Tiverton and a drawn match with Devonport Services.

In the friendly games the team enjoyed success most notably against Hereford, Stourbridge, ConeyHill, and Wotton Bassett as well as gaining a creditable draw away at BerryHill.

A special match was arranged to celebrate 50 years of playing at the Mannings Ground and Drybrook came out on top against the Invitation XV by 27pts – 5pts. The day also included a series of junior matches, a women's game and a veterans' match against Bream RFC who were the first ever visitors to the Mannings.

In the County Cup Drybrook lost out in the second round at Dings Crusaders whilst interest in the Forest Cup ended with a poor performance at Cinderford United.

Drybrook's season spluttered after this, losing to Old Patesians in the county cup, before having to contend with some very difficult friendlies against the likes of Rumney, BerryHill and Spartans.

By the time April arrived the squad were down to the bare bones but managed to win through a bruising Forest Senior Cup Semi-Final match with Cinderford United.

A few days later Drybrook were back in league action at Keynsham where they were forced to field a very inexperienced team and were completely taken apart. The rampant home side, en route to the title, notched up victory by 110pts – 7pts.

In the Forest Cup final Drybrook went down to Lydney United by 18pts – 28pts at Bream RFC. Despite a long injury list and much unavailability during the season the team still managed to win 14 and draw 2 of their 31 games. Chris Treherne helped himself to 325 points (11 tries) which included setting a new club record of 31 points in the win over Avonmouth. among their eight league victories with a rare victory over Matson in a friendly fixture also a fine achievement.

Ultimately it was Drybrook's away form in the league (only one win in eight games) as opposed to their home form that let them down.

#### SEASON 1998-1999

The club parted company with Coach Nick Price in the summer but their quest for a replacement to take on the role proved fruitless despite extensive advertising. In the end senior players Chris Treherne and Chris Tingle came on board to assist captain Chris Rawlings for a while until Peter Jones was coaxed out of retirement to come back for another stint. Jones soon got the squad motivated and was not afraid to blood some of the youngsters from the newly formed Colts XV.

Indeed in the opening game with Bream four teenagers, Tom Reed, Scott Mayo, Lee Ward



and Danny Griffiths all made their 1<sup>st</sup> XV debut. They could not have picked a better game to start with as Drybrook roared to a 59pts – 10pts victory in a game best remembered for the scoring exploits of Chris Treherne. In fact Drybrook beat second placed ConeyHill, and third placed Old Redcliffians as well as notching up several other notable victories but they lost out to some of the lesser teams albeit by some very close scores.

In other competitions Drybrook fell at the first hurdle in the National NPI cup at Thornbury (27pts – 43pts) and went down disappointingly to Lydney United in the Forest Cup semi-final (19pts – 31pts) where a late flourish brought victory for the men from Regentsholme.

In the county cup Drybrook pulled off a good win at BerryHill in Round 1, but were then eliminated from the cup over a dispute with setting up a date for the second round tie with Cinderford.

Sandal RFC from West Yorkshire were among the new fixtures played along with Aldermaston who provided the opposition in the very last match. All eyes were on the game to see if Drybrook could remain unbeaten and they duly delivered with a 51pts – nil victory over their Berkshire visitors.

Mandy Worthen proved herself to be the top scrum half in the area with Clair Adams, Tracey Jarrett, Jackie Atkins, Jessica Cox and Shelley Bourne all playing well throughout the season.

## JUNIOR SECTION.

This season the club were able to field teams from under 8's through to the under 14's age group and were again successful especially in lower age teams. The under 8 team contained future England women's international Ceri Large and she scored two tries in a handsome 55pts – nil victory over neighbours Cinderford in a game which saw Matt Sumner cross the whitewash four times. New clubs on the fixture list this year included Avon and Penarth and the season ended with a very successful tour to Minehead in Somerset.

On tour the under 13's played in a tournament at Hornets RFC in Weston-Super-Mare and played matches for the first time against Devonport Services, Yatton and Midsomer Norton as well as against the host club.

#### **SEASON 1999-2000**

fter their highest ever placing last term Drybrook could reasonably have expected to be among the front runners this season. Unfortunately the league campaign was blighted by a string of narrow losses by a team getting weary of travelling the M5 week in and week out.

It was commonplace for the team to travel under strength so it was little surprise that they faced an uphill battle for most of the season. The South West league committee had recognised the problems being faced by some clubs and proposed a complete restructuring


round match at BerryHill which saw Drybrook victorious by 21pts – 16pts.


The best result was the quarter-final win at ConeyHill in a typically robust encounter that resulted in a 22pts – 19pts victory over the Western Counties League champions.

# LADIES RUGBY



Cirencester and Spartans had both recruited extensively after dropping down from the Western Counties League and Bristol outfit BartonHill were also looking strong. Spartans in particular assembled a very experienced and formidable squad and were most people's tip for the top spot.

Drybrook recruited flanker Sean Bourne and fullback Martin Ennis from Cinderford and with the return of centre Ian Murray from college prospects looked bright. Promising second row Dale



Critchley was not available until late November having decided to go travelling during the closed season.

Chris Rawlings was elected skipper for a fifth season and Coach Peter Jones was joined by Leon Meek who concentrated on the backs. The club also welcomed new shirt sponsors in the shape of Gloucester company Supreme Services who were involved in the supply of labour to the haulage industry.

The team also had a better playing surface to perform on as the club had spent a good deal of time and effort laying new drainage pipes in the first team pitch.

Drybrook lost their first league outing when they were beaten by 10pts – 13pts at Cirencester as well as suffering a first round exit in the RFU Intermediate Cup (18pts – 23pts) at Old Centralians.

Following these initial setbacks the league soon developed into a two horse race between Drybrook and Spartans.

The first meeting at Spartans went the way of the home side (15pts – 17pts) where skipper Chris Rawlings agonisingly missed a conversion kick in front of the posts that would have earned his side a draw.

The best performance came from the Under 15's who rose to the occasion to win 32-5 on the bowling green type conditions.


Following the rugby the tour party were entertained at Bruscain's clubhouse in Le Brusc harbour.


Off the field the club had a new President in Gerald Ward and he encouraged former players and supporters to stay involved by initiating a new vice-presidents scheme.

The end of season junior presentation day was attended by a huge crowd of players, their families and supporters.




# JUNIOR RUGBY

in the county cup and it was November before the first league points arrived with victory over Oldfield Old Boys.

With no sign of results improving Dave Guyan left the club by mutual consent and senior players Chris Rawlings and Neil Morgan stepped in to replace him until the end of the season.

Slowly but surely results improved as players began to return and the target was to try and keep Drybrook in the league. They almost did it by ending up third from bottom and out of the automatic relegation places. Restructuring higher up in the leagues, and the knock on effect though, led to three going down so unfortunately it meant a return to Gloucestershire Premier.

It was not all doom and gloom and from January onwards the playing record was actually quite good with the team even giving the title winners Taunton a run for their money at their impressive new headquarters. 

It was another busy year for the section with teams competing at nearly every age grade and a tour to the South West of France for the Under 16 XV.




Skipper Gareth Ruck with his Under 16 squad prior to the game with Sanary/Le Brusc which resulted in a 12pts – nil victory for the combined team.



Drybrook won the first league match at BartonHill and then overcame Bream in the 1<sup>st</sup> Round of the RFU Powergen Vase.

Aretians were overwhelmed (55 -8) in the next game which was a personal triumph for Chris Rawlings who not only played in his 500<sup>th</sup> 1<sup>st</sup> XV game but also became the first person to play in 200 league matches for the club.

Things went rapidly downhill after this with the team losing five league matches on the trot and an injury to skipper Neil Merrett left them without a regular goal kicker for a period.

## **JUNIOR RUGBY**

When Drybrook's young players turned up for training at the start of this season they were issued with a smart new match strip. Every team from Under 7's to Under 17's now had matching club colours for the first time.

Three teams attracted local sponsors while the rest were funded by a £500 grant from the parish council in recognition of the work done in the local community.

The sponsors were; U16's – Richard's Crane & Transport, U10's – Fisher Builders, U9's – Ross Aviation.

The section also had some assistance in the form of students from Hartpury College and the University of Gloucestershire for the first time. As part of their courses the students came along to provide first aid cover, referee matches and help out with the coaching duties. This helped to ease the burden of running such a large and successful section.

The teams did not let their new sponsors down and the playing records were again impressive. The Under 12's in particular did extremely well and won the Cheltenham tournament as well as defending their crown at the BerryHill tournament. They failed in their bid to reach the county final when they were defeated by eventual winners St Marys at the quarter final stage after coming through a tough pool that included Bristol, Cirencester, Painswick and Stroud.

time as the club house was not big enough to accommodate the increase in numbers.


England and British Lions prop Phil Vickery was the guest of honour, presenting the awards and giving a well-received speech about the value of grass roots rugby.

The club also received another boost with the news that a Colts XV was to be run for the first time in 10 years.

Pre-season went very well with comfortable victories over Ross and Gloucester Old Boys but a reversal at home to a higher ranked Gordon League was not unexpected.

Once the league programme got underway Drybrook set the pace with a string of vic-

tories including those over eventual champions Avonmouth and runners-up Widden Old Boys.

The league soon became a three horse race with Drybrook as the favourites but unexpected defeats against Old Richians and Cirencester (twice) meant that Avonmouth and Widden were always in contention.

Into the business end of the season Drybrook defeated Widden for the second time but lost out at Avonmouth (12 - 18) in a game that went the way of the Bristol men on a saturated pitch.

It all came down to the last weekend and if all three won then points difference would come in to it. Avonmouth claimed top spot but although Drybrook beat Matson, news came through that Widden had won by over 80 points at sorry Painswick to claim the play-off spot.

Drybrook achieved the same number of wins as the two teams above them and had the best defensive record in the league but there undoing was undoubtedly two narrow home defeats to Old Richians (10 - 11) and Cirencester (10 - 11)

There was not much luck on the cup front either with defeat at Bicester in the EDF Energy Senior Vase and a 26pts – nil reversal at Dings Crusaders in the county cup. The club put all this disappointment behind them and enjoyed a short end of season tour to Yorkshire, staying at the Regent Hotel in Doncaster, and playing against Wheatley Hill RFC.



The Girls section was indebted to the Two Rivers Housing Association who gave a grant which helped considerably to offset the running costs.







ith skipper Neil Morgan forced to stand down due to long term injury, flanker Lee Ward became the new club captain. Little did anyone realise what a difficult season lay ahead with injuries, unavailability and defections decimating the squad, leading to a lack of confidence and commitment.

It started with a poor turnout at pre-season training and the announcement that coach Paul Hudson had decided to stand down citing increased personal and work commitments. The club moved quickly to secure a new head coach and showed great vision to appoint Anthony O'Riordan as his replacement.

placing from the season before was deemed suitable qualification for inclusion by the county committee.

It was estimated that Jean cooked over 100,000 after match meals for players and supporters in her 43 year stint since 1968.




The club put the disappointment of relegation behind them by working tirelessly behind the scenes to make sure that the right structures were put in place to ensure future success.





On the same day the Drybrook under 8 team were victorious at a new competition held at the Forest of Dean Activities Festival.


# **OFF THE FIELD**



In the clubhouse presentations were made followed by rousing renditions of God Save the Queen and the Canada national anthem.



It was at this stage that Drybrook put together an excellent run of results with eight wins from the next ten fixtures.

Drybrook ended the year in good form as well with victory over Newent at the Mannings (21 – 17) and then a very impressive win at Okehampton (20 -17) just before the Christmas break.

The team carried this form over into the New Year and were clearly benefitting from the excellent coaching team and fitness facilities as they played some very impressive rugby.

Drybrook lost only two matches between January and the middle of April and both of these were on the road at Thornbury (16 – 25), and Clevedon (12 -17) against teams who were fighting for the play-off spot.

The run also saw runaway leaders Weston-super-Mare almost lose their 100% win record when they just managed to hold out for a draw at the Mannings.

A late penalty kick would have given Drybrook a well-deserved victory over the big spending visitors but unfortunately the kick went wide.

On the final day of the league season Drybrook had to beat North Petherton with a bonus point try to secure third place in the league. They managed to do this with another top class performance and in doing so secured the bragging rights as Gloucestershire's highest placed club in the division.

This was the highest ever position Drybrook had achieved since leagues began with only eight county clubs placed higher in the structure. This list included Premiership giants Gloucester and Bristol as well as Championship destined Hartpury.

The Forest Senior Cup was beset by the now regular problems of teams withdrawing and Drybrook received a bye into the final when Lydney pulled out of the scheduled semi-final tie.

However their season tailed off badly in April after going from November through till the end of March unbeaten.


